HIDEAWAY OF THE YEAR

Abbaye de la Bussière

Burgundy, France




THIS ANCIENT CISTERCIAN ABBEY near Dijon was purchased in 2005 by the Cummings family from England. After meticulous renovation, it is now a truly wonderful property. Wrought-iron gates swing open, and across a walled 15-acre park you glimpse a magical threestory 14th-Century manor house constructed of mellow golden limestone. After uncomplicated formalities in the great hall (everyone at the hotel is bilingual), you are escorted to one of the hotel's 11 rooms. Furnished with antiques and tapestries, these are both comfortable and atmospheric. Stylish baths have granite surfaces, Jacuzzi tubs and monsoon showers. Chef Olivier Elzer is an exceptional talent whose menus marry tradition with the demand for healthier eating. And our meals were animated by a brilliant young sommelier. AUSTRALIA/NEW ZEALAND

Capella Lodge

Lord Howe Island, Australia

LORD HOWE ISLAND LIES two hours by plane northeast of Sydney. The approach by air provides a stunning overview of the island's scarcely believable natural beauty. A crescent of land approximately six miles long by one mile wide, it is covered by a rain forest of ferns, mosses and orchids that extends to a shoreline ringed by white-



sand beaches. Offshore, a lagoon displays every color of a peacock's tail. And at its southern tip, the island rears upward in the twin spires of Mount Lidgbird and Mount Gower (2,870 feet).

Capella Lodge is perfectly situated, with a view of Mount Gower to leave even the worldliest traveler gasping. After a \$2 million refurbishment at the end of 2004, it now offers a chic and sophisticated beach-house ambience. (The property's renewal was supervised by James Baillie, who was previously responsible for the dramatic upgrades of Lizard and Bedarra islands, the two premier resorts on the Great Barrier Reef.) Bleached timbers, white shutters, wicker loungers, polished floors and splashy cushions all help to create an appealing contemporary style.

Capella has nine accommodations, of which the "Lidgbird Suite" is the most opulent, with a spacious wraparound deck, hot tub and spellbinding 270-degree view. We also enthusiastically recommend the duplex "Lagoon Suites" (especially #2). Baths are functional, with single vanities and walk-in monsoon showers.

An infinity-edge plunge pool is set into the deck right off the dining room. There, imaginative threecourse dinners feature island produce and fish from the surrounding waters. (A meat alternative is always provided.) The wine list is short but excellent. At the resort itself, the principal facility is a spa that offers a menu based on native flora and local basalt rocks. Otherwise, you can be as active or as indolent as you wish. Some people make the eight-hour climb to the top of Mount Gower, while others content themselves with a little snorkeling. The ideal time for a visit is December through February, which corresponds to summer in Sydney. Lodge Suite for two, \$1,085, breakfast, dinner, selected wines and airport transfers included. Claremont Estate

Waipara, New Zealand

LOCATED AT WAIPARA, an hour's drive from the southern city of Christchurch, Claremont is set on a 2,400-acre working livestock farm surrounded by rugged hills, ancient forests and meandering streams. The estate itself is a wonderfully civilized enclave of lush lawns, stately trees and cheerful flower gardens. The house, built in 1866 and restored and modernized in 1999-2000, is a handsome two-story rough-hewn limestone structure with wide verandahs. Walking through the front door, you instantly receive an impression of refined but homey comfort. Guests have the use of two delightful living rooms, both filled with paintings and family photographs, along with a well-stocked library. Glass doors open onto shady vineclad verandahs and sunny walled courtyards.

Each of the five suites is named for a different flower and is decorated in a traditional style with antique furniture, Oriental rugs and lovely floral fabrics. Large tiled baths offer walk-in showers and deep soaking tubs. We particularly recommend the upper-floor suites, as they afford wonderful views of the property.

Each evening, guests gather with owners Richard and Rosie Goord for drinks and canapés. Dinner is served at a big oak refectory table (though those who wish to dine privately may do so in the conservatory). Lamb and venison from the estate are accompanied by local Waipara wines. Our rack of lamb served with garden zucchini and mushroom risotto was superb. Many activities are within an easy drive. The local wineries are well worth visiting, and at Kaikoura, there is whale-watching year-round. The options for trout and salmon fishing are innumerable.
